Finances

Financial aid for international students is extremely limited. While all applicants are eligible for merit scholarships, international students who are not permanent residents or U.S. citizens are generally not eligible for need-based aid. At maximum, such assistant as is available will only cover a small portion of tuition. Financial aid forms are available after January 1st and will be available online. If you have questions, you may contact the Financial Aid Counselor, Desiree Roundtree, at (718) 780-0395. You may be requested by U.S. Customs and Border Protections to show financial statements indicating your ability to support yourself while studying in the U.S. It is advisable for you to have this documentation in your possession upon your arrival and when you leave and/or re-enter the country. Typically, notarized bank statements and letters guaranteeing support are sufficient.

Immigration Information

After you have been formally accepted for admission to Brooklyn Law School and provided sufficient financial documentation, you will receive your I-20 Certificate of Eligibility. This form should be used to schedule a visa interview and then taken with your passport to the nearest United States Consul who will issue an F-1 (student) visa. A student may not be granted an F-1 visa unless funding is available and documented. The Form I-20 must be presented to immigration officials upon your arrival in the United States, as well as each time you leave and re-enter the country. Please be sure to have the I-20 properly endorsed for travel at least 10 days prior to any departure from the United States. Canadian citizens do not need to obtain the F-1 visa but they do need the I-20 Certificate of Eligibility.

As a holder of a student visa, you are required to enroll in a program of at least 10 credit hours and to maintain satisfactory academic progress.

Employment

Employment of international students is carefully regulated by U.S. Immigration laws. It is illegal for a student on a non-immigrant visa to work without permission. Since international students are expected to show evidence of financial support before they are permitted to enter the United States, be advised that the immigration authorities will not grant work permission to students during the first twelve months of their stay in the country.
