REGULATIONS CONCERNING CONDUCT ON THE LAW SCHOOL CAMPUS AND OTHER LAW SCHOOL PROPERTY USED FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES

RESPONSIBLE OFFICER: The Vice Dean for Academic Affairs and the Assistant Dean for Student Affairs

DATE REISSUED: July 27, 2015

To ensure that the Law School campus and other Law School property shall be used for educational purposes without undue interference or interruption and to ensure the health and safety of faculty, students, staff and all other persons lawfully on Law School premises, the Board of Trustees of Brooklyn Law School, pursuant to Chapter 676 of the Laws of 1980, amending Sec. 6450 of the Education Law, at its regular meeting on Tuesday, January 20, 1981, amended the regulations adopted by the said Board on Thursday, May 22, 1969, as follows

Sec. 1.

- a. No person may destroy, mutilate or deface any Law School property or the property of any member of the faculty, office staff or student body located on Law School premises.
- b. No person may disrupt the normal functioning of the Law School by sitting in or seizing classrooms or any other portion of the Law School property.
- c. No person may disrupt the normal functioning of the Law School by blocking access to classrooms or other facilities, or by harassing students or faculty, or in any other manner.
- d. No person shall engage in any conduct which recklessly or intentionally endangers mental or physical health or involves the forced consumption of liquor or drugs for the purpose of initiation into or affiliation with any organization.
- e. No organization shall authorize the conduct prohibited by subdivision d.
- f. The word "person" shall include a student, a member of the faculty, a member of the office or administrative staff, and a visitor to the Law School, an invitee, licensee or trespasser.
- g. The word "organization" is intended to include the *Law Review*, *Journal of International Law*, *Journal of Law and Policy*, *Journal of Corporate, Financial and Commercial Law* and every society, fraternity, sorority, association, committee, of which two or more students of Brooklyn Law School are members, whether organized for educational, scholarly, social communal, or other purposes and whether or not officially recognized by the Student Bar Association of the Law School.

Sec. 2 The Dean of the Law School is directed to eject any person who violates Sec. 1.

Sec. 3 a. If the violator of these regulations is a student, charges shall be brought against the student and a hearing shall be held in accordance with the Student Discipline Procedures. If the violator is a faculty member, charges shall be brought against the faculty member in accordance with the Faculty Regulations.
