Pro Bono Project Spotlight:

Unemployment Action Center

“With Unemployment Action Center, I have learned the joy of advocating for unemployed workers seeking benefits. In one case, the petitioner was denied unemployment insurance because his employer claimed he was terminated for misconduct, but we successfully argued to the Administrative Law Judge that leaving work early by an hour one time in his ten years with the company does not meet the standard of misconduct under the law. Because of the training that UAC provided, I was not only able to [support the petitioner] obtain the assistance he needed while searching for a new job, but I was also able to obtain the skills I needed to feel confident pursuing litigation as a career.”

Endangered Lawyers? Attorney Independence in the Department of Justice



"Over the past year, we have seen an unprecedented purge of career DOJ lawyers whose only offense seems to have been doing their jobs – impartially and with integrity. Those who have stayed face the difficult task of reconciling their professional obligations with adherence to legally questionable directives from Department Leadership. Dozens of judges have called out DOJ attorneys for misstating facts and defying judicial orders.

This program examines the developments over the past year at DOJ, focusing on professional conduct issues confronting DOJ lawyers under the current Administration. The program is presented in recognition of the 2026 International Day of the Endangered Lawyer, which since 2010 has sought to concentrate attention on the specific challenges faced by lawyers in particular countries in which they have found themselves under siege. For the Day of the Endangered Lawyer in 2026, the chosen country of focus is the United States."

Dorothy E. Roberts Public Interest Essay Competition

Topic: "Submissions must focus on a specific legal issue within the realm of public interest law, including any issue relating to social justice or advancing the general welfare and good of the public. In addition, the author must include a brief grant proposal for \$5,000 to support public interest work related to the essay topic. Topics can be local, state, national, or international in breadth or impact."

TOPIC

Student-authored articles on the topic of social justice and public interest law. Submissions must focus on a specific legal issue within the realm of public interest law, including any issue relating to social justice or advancing the general welfare and good of the public. In addition, the author must include a brief grant proposal for \$5,000 to support public interest work related to the essay topic. Topics can be local, state, national, or international in breadth or impact.

Deadline for submission is February 28, 2026.

The Havens Wright Center for Social Justice

Erik Olin Wright Prize

The Erik Olin Wright Prize (\$1,000) is awarded annually by the Havens Wright Center for Social Justice for a paper by a graduate or professional student that best exemplifies the concerns that animated Wright's work. You can find a brief description of his work and more information about the prize on this [website](#).

Eligible submissions can come from any of the social sciences, history, or philosophy, and any professional discipline. Submissions are welcome from universities outside the U.S., but they should be submitted in English. One submission is allowed per applicant. Two documents are required.

1. The student work to be considered. This can be no more than 15,000 words (excluding references but including footnotes). Published works may be considered so long as they were completed within the previous calendar year (i.e., between April 16, 2025 - April 15, 2026).
2. A nominating letter from a faculty member familiar with the student's work.

Submissions, in whole or in part, may be sent between March 1 and April 15 each year and should be sent to wrightprize@ssc.wisc.edu.

Submissions received after April 15 will not be considered.



ATTENTION STUDENTS! (especially graduating students)

The deadline to log pro bono hours for Public Service Awards is **March 15** of your graduating year. **On February 15, all BLS pro bono opportunities will open on Paladin for students to log their hours (instructions below).**




